Pastor's Report, January 2024

We just finished one of our Wednesday night Bible Study's and we looked at the passage we will read Sunday from Luke's Gospel. Joseph and Mary brought Jesus for his purification where he was to be circumcised after eight days and two pigeons were sacrificed — all this in accord with Moses' law in Leviticus chapter 12. This detail is important because it shows how Jesus was Jewish and his parents were devout and lived as closely as they could according to Jewish laws and customs. It's crazy that so much antisemitism is rooted in Christianity — in various Christian groups — when Jesus and his family and ancestors -- WERE JEWS!

In this reading, as Jesus was being presented to the Temple, there were two holy people on hand to witness, a man, Simeon, and a woman, Anna. Simeon "praised God" and said: "My eyes have seen your salvation...a light for revelation to the gentiles and for glory to your people Israel. Then Simeon turned to Mary and said: "This child is destined...to be a sign that will be opposed...and a sword will pierce your own soul, too."

The woman, Anna, was 84 and had lived most of her life as a widow (she was married only seven years when her husband died). She also praised God and said to all who were looking that Jesus was "the redemption of Jerusalem."

It's a mixed message, and I suppose it always has been, and will be. Jesus was proclaimed as the salvation and redemption of both gentiles and Jews — of all people. But, as Simeon said, many would oppose Jesus. If Jesus is the salvation that God had planned for the world, much of the world was saying "no." Jesus would be widely rejected, a fate that would be pain like a sword piercing his mother's soul.

The Bible, like life, seems to give such a mixed message. The

prologue of John's Gospel captures this contradiction and confusion wonderfully with its images of light and darkness. Jesus, the light shining God's blessing on creation, and people choosing darkness, craving the shadows more than "the way, the truth, and the life."

And so we head into 2024 as we would march ourselves into a hurricane. Because even if we've just been occasionally glancing at the news and the events that are coming up on the near horizon — there's a storm coming that would cause even the sunniest starry-eyed optimist to collapse in fear and anxiety. The election of 2024. What can we compare it to? It's potentially worse than the Great Depression, Pearl Harbor, D-Day and 9/11 — COMBINED! We are moving into an uncertain future of unimaginable consequence. No — not moving — but sleepwalking. Sleepwalking is the more accurate term that some, like ex-Senator Liz Chaney, have used. Sleepwalking.

Morally, religiously, spiritually we do not seem aware or even to care, as a nation, the direction in which we are moving. The poet said it so well: "The falcon cannot hear the falconer." We are becoming deaf to God's voice of peace (rather than hate), forgiveness (rather than revenge and retribution) and truth (rather than propaganda and conspiracy theories).

"The best lack all conviction, while the worst are full of passionate intensity." Yes. There is more fire, more emotion and cheers and growing crowds and poll numbers for a man who quotes Hitler! Where is Lincoln now? Where is the leader who will appeal to "the better angels of our nature." Lincoln told the crowd at his first inaugural address, where seven southern states had already seceded: "We are not enemies, but friends. We must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained it must not break our bonds of affection. The mystic chords of memory, stretching from every battlefield and patriot grave to every living heart and hearthstone all over this broad land, will yet swell the

chorus of the Union, when again touched, as surely they will be, by the better angels of our nature." Where is Lincoln? Where is Martin Luther King? Where is Dorothy Day? Instead, we've become enthralled — intoxicated — by a lost soul who claims some are "poisoning the blood." Just as the one who claimed in 1925 the Jews were poisoning the blood of Germans. Where is Jesus? GOD — WHERE ARE YOU!!!???

I can't remember any New Year that I have been more frightened to enter than this one, 2024. But love casts out fear, yes? That's what we're told in John's letter. Love casts out fear. And look at the situation of Jesus and Joseph and Mary. They lived under the rule of a foreign dictator, a Caesar. They endured the rule of a wicked king, Herod, and a cruel and violent governor, Pilate. So why should we worry or be anxious for the future. With God, they endured -- so will we.

At the end of our Bible Study we realized that what we need to get through — whatever it is we need to get through — is not some particular leader, or winning 600 million dollars in Powerball, or moving. What we need is faith. In everything we need to trust God, that despite the growing hatred and violence and apparent dissolution of the good in the world, that God is still Almighty. And with Christ alive and growing in our hearts and minds, we do not need to fear or be anxious. Because love and being anchored to that is what matters. So let us not sleepwalk, but walk wide awake into 2024 praying for an even stronger faith, that no matter what, we can — in the words of Teresa of Avila (who spent time in prison during the Spanish Inquisition and knew her share of hardship):

"Let nothing disturb you Let nothing frighten you All things are passing; God only is changeless. Patience gains all things.
Who has God wants nothing.
God alone suffices."
