Pastor's Report, December 2023

Early in the Bible, just eighteen chapters into Genesis, we are given a look into the character of Abraham. God has just told Abraham that the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah will be destroyed because of their wickedness. But Abraham tried to change God's mind. The deal was if Abraham could find fifty righteous people in the city, God would not destroy it. Then Abraham said, "What if I can find 45 — no — 40? How about 30? 20? 10? Abraham got God to agree to just ten righteous people. God would not destroy Sodom and Gomorrah if just ten good people could be found. Eventually God destroyed the cities because not even ten good people could be found. But the point is — Abraham revealed something about his character — he was an advocate for other people. He didn't know these people and they were foreigners. They were not of his family or his tribe and they did not worship or follow his God. And yet he still tried to save their lives. Why?

Now go to the next book of the Bible, Exodus. In chapter thirtytwo, God is angry because the people of Israel were unfaithful and broke the covenant — like a marriage vow — they made with God. The people made an idol, a golden calf, and offered their worship and devotion to this piece of metal. God told Moses that because of their betrayal and unfaithfulness, God would destroy them. And what did Moses do? The people were wrong and Moses knew it. They gave their word and swore to follow God and quickly broke their promise. But despite the people's crime against God, Moses begged God to spare their lives. Moses even offered his life in exchange for the lives of the many that God was about to kill. Why? These weren't good people he was trying to protect — they had just broken a sacred promise — they had just abandoned God and turned to idol worship. But Moses begged God to take his life — so these "bad" people could live. Why?

Finally, look at chapter forty-two in the book of Job. Job has just seen God — his mind has "opened" to a vision of a larger world, and so he repents of his ignorance and the mistakes of judgment he made when he thought he knew everything, but was wrong. Now God is about to punish Job's friends. These were three people who came to Job when Job was suffering, when Job had lost his family, his children, his property — everything, even his health. And these three men told Job that he deserved all the hardship and agony he was experiencing — because he must have done something really bad to have brought all this suffering upon himself. At the end of the book, we are told that Job's friends were wrong and for their cruelty and ignorance and the added pain they caused Job, God would punish them. Only Job's prayer for these three men who hurt him so badly could save them. And Job prayed for them, and so God did not punish them. The three men caused Job more suffering — and they were wrong. Despite that — Job begged God to forgive them? Why?

Because even thousands of years before Christ, Jesus is with us: Abraham begging God's mercy for the wicked; Moses offering his life so God's enemies could live; Job pleading God to spare his accusers the punishment they deserved. It was Jesus, the image of God in us, transfiguring hearts and minds into love, then as now. In his first sermon, from a mountain, Jesus preached: 43 "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' 44 But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, 45 that you may be children of your Father in heaven. He causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous. 46 If you love those who love you, what reward will you get? Are not even the tax collectors doing that? 47 And if you greet only your own people, what are you doing more than others? Do not even pagans do that? 48 Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect.

The Trustees met on Nov. 19 to review financial statements and discuss activities.

To date, expenditures and income are within budgeted levels and we anticipate a carry-over into the 2024 fiscal year.

At the encouragement of our insurer, the group discussed engaging an appraiser to assess the adequacy of your current insurance policy for the church property and we will see what the cost for this looks like prior to moving forward.

We have secured a proposal for painting the church ceiling and repairing cracks in the wall, and will fine tune this proposal for consideration for the 2024 year.

We also plan to buy new, lighter-weight round tables for use in the Parish Hall.

The Pledge Drive to support next year's church budget is in full swing. To date we've received about 20 pledges. It costs more than \$150,000 each year to run the church, so every pledge is important. You can make your pledge on a pledge card (available from me, in the narthex, or you can download one from the church's website!) or you can call me or e-mail me with the amount you'd like to pledge for the coming year. In an ideal world, all pledges will be received by the middle of December so the Budget Committee and Board of Trustees can draft a budget for the annual meeting in January.

Here are answers to popular pledge drive questions:

Q - Why should I fill out a pledge card?

A - By completing and returning your pledge card, the amount you pledge will be included in the budget. The budget enables us to plan for the coming year.

Q - How much should I pledge?

A - Pledge what you are comfortable giving. If your financial situation should change during the year, you can adjust your pledge amount by just letting me or the church's treasurer know.

Q - Can I pledge on-line?

A – Yes. There is a link on the church webpage (www.dunbarchurch.com) for making donations including your pledge.

Q - How can I get a box of offertory envelopes?

A – Anyone who fills out a pledge card can receive a box of envelopes. Some people choose not to get them, and that's okay too.


