Pastor's Report, Summer 2023

We're about a month into summer now. Some years ago I had a ritual where I'd watch the Walt Disney movie Summer Magic as a way of celebrating the season and recognizing "the lazy, hazy, crazy days" that were ahead. There used to be this magical aura that summer had — maybe because of the school breaks from childhood and going on vacation to St. Petersburg, Florida and playing hide-and-seek in the yard as the day grew dark and the lightning bugs came out. "Roll out those lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer," Nat King Cole sang, "those days of soda and pretzels and beer. Roll out those lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer, dust off the sun and moon and sing a song of cheer."

That's what summer was — a song of cheer. Now summer has lost some of its Walt Disney glow and it's more a season of weather alerts and new heat wave records and once-in-athousand-year catastrophic floods, fires, tornadoes and hurricanes. Summer is now a time to brace ourselves for climate change repercussions. Farmers Insurance has pulled out its coverage from Florida and parts of California, with more states to follow. And when Nat Cole sang about hazy days, he didn't mean smoke pollution from wildfires. And did he know that the artificial sweetener in sodas caused cancer? Did he realize that pretzels, those baked pastries of white flour and salt, aren't healthy — and did he know that beer companies would be boycotted because they reach out to transgenders and others not in the sexual orientation mainstream? Did Nat King Cole anticipate all this horror that something as lovely and joyful and carefree as summer would turn into? Are we living in the endtime???

My God, I'd love to go back to those lazy, hazy crazy days of sodas and pretzels and beer, days when you could eat and drink all that stuff and not feel so guilty, when the hazy days didn't

cause asthma and upper respiratory diseases. They were just hazy days. And crazy was just about going out and having wild fun and didn't mean you had to fill yourself with tranquilizers and medications to keep from going insane.

Look at the nightmare we've made for ourselves, the hot earth, polarization among people who used to call themselves neighbors, chemicals and pollutants in our foods. And all of this doom-thinking the result of my free-associations from Walt Disney's Summer Magic. Whew — maybe I do need this vacation. If you've ever seen the movie I'm talking about here — Summer Magic — it's a variation of Cinderella and Snow White and Beauty and the Beast, where a well-to-do Boston family is down on their luck and has to sell their stuff and house and move into the country in Beulah, Maine — they live in a nice country house but can't afford the rent and they become poorer and poorer but in the end Hayley Mills and the rich owner of the property fall in love at a square-dance and it looks by movie's end that they'll marry and live happily ever after.

I wish Disney had given us his version of the gospels, maybe something where the poor carpenter's son Jesus meets and falls in love with the queen of someplace and they form an alliance of kingdoms on the earth and bring about a lasting peace that carries over to the next life and even the devil has a conversion and dedicates his life to helping people resolve conflicts and soldiers melt their weapons and war-machinery into plows and solar-powered cars. I guess, in his way, that's exactly what Disney tried to do — but these days, even that company is struggling. We're all struggling with something. Which, I suppose, is how it should be. That's life.

Jesus said: "If any wish to come after me, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it." Because that's life. It's not a fairy tale or a way without pain or suffering, but it is the path, somehow, to happily ever after. The real path, including, somehow, now, this moment. Maybe it doesn't make sense. But don't blame Jesus. People didn't understand him then either. And God never asked us to understand, only to trust. So let's thank God, no matter how lazy and hazy and crazy our days get. And while we're at it, we may as well dust off the sun and moon and sing a song of cheer.
