Pastor's Report, Summer 2025

Ernest Hemingway said when you've got writer's block or don't know what to write, just write one true sentence. And the rest will follow. So I'm looking for that now, my one true sentence to give you this third Friday of July, 2025. It's the middle of summer. Children have been out of school about a month, and in a month they will be returning. Annie will be moving off to her first year as a student at Sacred Heart University. Yesterday on her second attempt at her drivers license — the driving part of the test she passed. I was excited, and surprised, to hear that. I expected her to pass on the third or fourth attempt. Already she's claiming her mother's car as her own. She's going to put one of those car air fresheners in it. I said "Oh please don't do that. Those make me sick." I said "the welcoming prayer" to myself: "Welcome, welcome. I let go of my desire for security, affection, and control — like controlling what Annie puts in her mother's car even if it makes me sick — and I embrace this moment completely." Annie didn't know I said that to myself. I think to reassure me she scratched a part of the wrapper it comes in and stuck it under my nose and said, "Here — smell it. It's nice right? Not too strong." It was something with coconut. I said, "Yeah — not bad...." And again said to myself, "Welcome, welcome — I let go of my desire for security....etc...."

Maybe that's the theme here. It's been a summer of welcoming prayers for me, a lot of practice letting go of desires for security, affection, control and just accepting whatever God — whatever the day — brings. Heat waves, humidity in air so heavy it feels like a swamp — but a lot of nice, summer stuff too. I kind-of became interested in the New York Yankees and record their games — there's one tonight. The games are still too long and slow and boring to watch — but if they're recorded, you can fast forward it on 2x or 3x speed and just slow it down when someone gets a hit or a home run. That way the game is over in 15 minutes. Janet's growing a vegetable garden and the zucchinis and yellow squash are doing well this year. She starts cooking every morning sometimes before 6:00. And Blue Trail, the band I play in has a gig tomorrow at Hindinger Farm and then another gig at Counter Weight in Hamden on 8/30. I think they brew their own beer. So that's always fun — to get together with the band and play songs.

Summer is like a Netflix series of episodes, every day a new story with Nat King Cole singing the opening soundtrack of each day, "Roll Out Those Lazy, Hazy, Crazy Days of Summer...." Nat nailed the summer vibe, the memories, the experience of summer with that song. It's so fun, so carefree, so

innocent. It says, come on everybody — it's summertime now! Roll out those lazy, crazy days of soda and pretzels and beer. Go to the drive-in and kiss your sweetheart in the car. I went on Youtube because this was Nat's song and watching him sing it again with his straw hat and holding the ukulele brings it all back. But I get a little nervous for Nat because he's the only black person in the video. All the backup singers are white men and women and when he gets to the part about taking your sweetheart to the drive-in, he gives a look at one of the women singers passing by and I think, O Nat — be careful because you look at a white woman like that those good of boys might lynch you.

You know who else sang a lot about summer fun? The Beach Boys. I'm thinking of the song, "And she'll have fun, fun, fun, till her daddy takes the T-Bird away." Or, "Sittin' in my car outside your house; remember when you spilled Coke all over your blouse; T-shirts, cut-offs, and a pair of thongs; We've been having fun all summer long." Fun, fun, fun. Even after all these years — those are still some of the soundtracks of my summer. Or the instrumental Theme from Endless Summer by The Sandals. A movie about making summer last all year long - an endless summer - by following the season around the world. Keep summer going and surf every day. Keep chasing the perfect wave (they found it at Cape St. Francis in South Africa).

Ahhhh, summer. I wish it were so. I wish everybody would have happiness now, and happiness in the future. I want everybody to enjoy lazy, hazy, crazy days, and kisses in the drive-in, and fun, fun, fun all summer long. But this isn't a Disney movie. In our country, our United States, there are at least three thousand people A DAY who are being captured, arrested, zip-tied and sent to holding places — cages — where they will be detained until deported to the country of their origin or even another country they've never been to. Three thousand, every day — that is the quota now the U.S. Government has made for the number of people without "papers" — legal documentation — to be taken from their places of work, from schools, Home Depots, motels, homes, public transportation — any place — even churches. ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) agents, often with masks, will come and snatch a person up, all ages, all genders. Something like 600 American citizens have been mistakenly taken this way. The news networks have done a terrible job of reporting this spiritual and moral catastrophe that is happening right now all around us.

Where are the Pro-Life people now? They were so successful in protecting the lives of the unborn. But we need Pro-Life voices to protect these

already-born. They want life too — they were living here and now they're not. Abort. Deport. Both two syllables that end with o r t. Both about ending a life. One ends a life in the womb, the other ends a life in America.

I am not Amos, or Isaiah, or Jeremiah. But however minor, I am still a prophet, saying on God's behalf, that what we Americans are doing to the people of other countries who live here and are trying to make a life for themselves and their families — as our ancestors did — is a moral, spiritual catastrophe and we must stop. I don't know how. Things seem so set in motion. There is so much momentum now for inhumanity. How do you stop it? The angel Gabriel, and Isaiah, and Jesus said nothing is impossible with God. Let's see. And while we wait, let us pray, "Welcome, welcome. I let go of my desire for security, affection and control, and I embrace this moment completely."
